Target/Specificity

The synthetic peptide sequence used to generate the antibody [AP8719c](/products/AP8719c) was selected from the Center region of human MC3R. A 10 to 100 fold molar excess to antibody is recommended. Precise conditions should be optimized for a particular assay.

Format

Peptides are lyophilized in a solid powder format. Peptides can be reconstituted in solution using the appropriate buffer as needed.

Storage

Maintain refrigerated at 2-8°C for up to 6 months. For long term storage store at -20°C.

- Background**

MC3R is a G-protein-coupled receptor for melanocyte-stimulating hormone and adrenocorticotrophic hormone that is expressed in tissues other than the adrenal cortex and melanocytes. This gene maps to the same region as the locus for benign neonatal epilepsy.
